

Purpose

The Aleutian Pribilof Island Community Development Association (APICDA) is a non-profit organization that serves residents of the following communities:

APICDA is a Western Alaska Community Development Quota (CDQ) organization dedicated to strengthening local fisheries-based economies by increasing direct fisheries participation in the Bering Sea and Aleutian Islands (BSAI), building support infrastructure and offering programs to assist the advancement of priority goals of the communities we serve. APICDA generates revenue through the management of CDQ quota, fisheries investements in the BSAI, and tourism operations. With guidance from the Board of Directors and staff, APICDA reinvests proceeds in its communities through a portfolio of regional education and training, public infrastructure development, economic development initiatives, job creation, community wellness, and cultural awareness initiatives.

What is your job at APICDA?



APICDA SCHOLARSHIPS

College Scholarships

APICDA has two college scholarships for graduating high school seniors and current undergraduate college students enrolled or accepted to a nationally or regionally accredited college or university.

Emil Berikoff, Sr. Memorial Scholarship (EBMS)

This program is named in honor of the late Emil Berikoff, Sr. of Unalaska, who served on the APICDA Board of Directors for 15 years prior to passing away in 2011. His contributions as a trusted board member and to the region were invaluable.

Applicants may be enrolled part-time (minimum 4 credits per guarter or 6 credits per semester) or full-time and must maintain a 2.0 GPA per term. Applicants must meet EBMS residency requirements and demonstrate financial need, with a family income cap of \$183,270.

EBMS Deadlines:

- April 1 for the summer term
- July 1 for fall, winter and spring terms (school year)
- November 15 for winter and spring terms

Haginaa Kidul (Helping to Grow) College Scholarship

This competitive scholarship program is available to residents of the APICDA CDQ member communities of Akutan, Atka, False Pass, Nelson Lagoon, St. George, and residents of the non-CDQ Aleutian-Pribilof region communities of Adak, Cold Bay, King Cove, Sand Point and Unalaska. Scholarships are awarded up to \$2,000 each per year (subject to change annually).

Eligibility Criteria

- Must be a full-time, permanent resident
- Enrolled as a FULL-TIME student
- Must maintain a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA
- Must show intent to return to Aleutian-Pribilof region indefinitely after completion of degree program
- Submit a complete application by June 1

Applications for all APICDA College Scholarship programs must be complete and received by APICDA by 5:00 PM AKST on the day of the deadline. We encourage applicants to apply early to ensure a timely submission of a complete application.

Vocational Training / Workforce Development Scholarships

APICDA offers two vocational training scholarships to adult residents.

Haginaa Kidul (Helping to Grow) Vocational Training Scholarship

This scholarship program is available to residents of the APICDA CDQ member communities of Akutan, Atka, False Pass, Nelson Lagoon, St. George, and residents of the non-CDQ Aleutian-Pribilof region communities of Adak, Cold Bay, King Cove, Sand Point and Unalaska. Scholarships are awarded up to \$2,000 each per year (subject to change annually).

Eligibility Criteria

- Must be a full-time, permanent resident
- Must be age 18 or older
- · Accepted to an accredited training program or vocational-technical institution
- Must show intent to return to Aleutian-Pribilof region indefinitely after completion of degree program
- Submit a complete application no later than 30 days prior to the program start date

Supplemental Education Scholarship

This scholarship program is available to qualifying residents of APICDA CDQ member communities and residents of Unalaska. Scholarships are awarded up to \$4,000 each per year, based on financial need.

Eligibility Criteria

- Must be age 18 or older
- · Accepted to an accredited training program or vocational-technical institution
- Maintain a 2.0 GPA or passing grade
- Submit a complete application no later than 10 business days prior to the program start date

Additional APICDA Scholarships

APICDA INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

EBMS GPA Scholarship

EBMS recipients who earn a 3.5 term GPA or higher are eligible for this scholarship. There is no application process; GPA Scholarship awards are automatically disbursed during the fall and spring terms.

Term GPA:	Award Amount:
3.5-3.74	\$500/term, up to \$1,000 per school year
3.75-3.99	\$750/term, up to \$1,500 per school year
4.00	\$1,000/term, up to \$2,000 per school year

Work Invest Now (WIN) Scholarship

Participants of APICDA's College and Youth Internship Program are eligible for this scholarship. Successful youth interns earn a \$500 WIN Scholarship per internship, which is temporarily held by APICDA until the student graduates high school and later applied towards college education or vocational-technical training expenses.

Successful participants of the College Internship Program are eligible to receive a \$2,000 WIN Scholarship to be disbursed during the fall and spring terms of the following academic year.

Students (youth and EBMS recipients) must apply for the APICDA Internship Program by March 15 and successfully complete an internship to be eligible for the WIN Scholarship. See page 9 for information about the Internship Program.

This program is available to residents of APICDA CDQ member communities and Unalaska. APICDA Internships provide opportunities to gain income, valuable working experience and (for some) earn additional scholarships. Internships are up to 12 weeks (three months), and may be arranged at local community agencies, at APICDA and its subsidiary companies, and other entities that directly serve the Aleutian-Pribilof Island region.

Some internship positions are prearranged, and others are developed as applications and intern requests by agencies are received. APICDA lists the positions available, and applicants interview for positions based on interest, experience, and availability.

2021 APIA-APICDA Internship Highlight

On July 22, 2021, Lori Jackson, APIA Medical Director and Family Nurse Practitioner, and APIA-APICDA interns, Julie Berikoff and Lisa Tran, arrived on St. George Island. The small team of three flew to St. George to help prepare the new Health Center for the grand reopening in mid-September and meet with patients during their visit. For interns Julie and Lisa, traveling from their hometown of Unalaska to work in another community in the Aleutian/ Pribilof Island region was a new experience.

"I had the opportunity to give direct patient care, give vaccinations, run different lab work tests, and do blood work," said Julie. "I really enjoyed interacting with all the kids and elders in this village and building relationships." During patient visits with Lori, Lisa and Julie provided patients with the most current information about COVID-19 and other health topics such as hypertension and smoking cessation. They also helped organize the new Health Center's pharmacy and emergency room and created educational flyers for the community.

When asked how she believes the new Health Center will impact the community, Lisa said, "The new facility serves as a more welcoming resource for individuals seeking healthcare services in St. George. Not only does the new clinic benefit the residents and visitors of St. George, but more room, upgraded systems, and new equipment means that providers and staff are able to run visits more efficiently."

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WRITING SUPPORT CORNER

Write a Winning Personal Statement

Most scholarship applications and college admissions require a personal statement of some sort. Using the APICDA Emil Berikoff, Sr. Memorial Scholarship (EBMS) Application as an example, here are some tips to make sure yours rises to the top!

Prepare/Brainstorm

Think before you write, making sure to address every part of the prompt. For example, here are the four parts of the EBMS Personal Statement prompt:

- 1. Your education/professional development goals
- 2. Why you wish to attend school
- 3. What you plan to do after receiving your degree
- 4. What contributions you believe you will be able to make to the communities of the APICDA region or to Alaska in general

It will make your essay stand out if you are as specific as possible. Tell YOUR story, one that can't be attributed to someone else. Give specific examples, even anecdotes (stories), for different parts of the prompt. For example, if your goal is to be the first person in your family to earn a 4-year degree, say so. If your mother inspired you to become a nurse because of her taking care of your aging grandparent or knowledge and use of herbal remedies, say so by telling a story.

Sometimes, it's difficult to answer these questions on your own, so don't hesitate to ask friends or family for advice. Also, remember, you don't have to use every piece of advice that someone gives to you.

Outline

Take each part of the prompt to use as a separate paragraph. It is best to keep them in the order that they were originally stated in the prompt. In this example, that means that you will have four body paragraphs, an introduction, and a conclusion for a total of six paragraphs. Creating an outline is an easy way for you to get your initial examples and anecdotes down on paper in an organized format. You can just use key words or shortened notes instead of writing out the entire example or anecdote on your outline.

Your introduction should first contain a hook, an attention-catching opening statement to grab your reader. Types of hooks include guotes, dialogue, statistics, guestions, and more. Google is your best friend when trying to come up with a good hook!

Next, your introduction should state who you are, as in where you're from and your family background. You can also state any special personal or family circumstances affecting your need for financial assistance. Finally, the last sentence in your introduction should be your thesis statement, which sums up the four topic sentences from your body paragraphs.

Your conclusion should be a mirror image of your introduction with some key insights added. Begin your conclusion with a restatement of your thesis followed by a reference to who you are and your family background. The last statement in your conclusion should refer to the hook in some way.

Your outline will look something like this:

- I. Introduction
 - A. Hook
 - B. Personal details (make this your own)
 - C. Thesis statement
- Body paragraph 1: Education/professional development goals 11.
 - A. Specific example 1
 - B. Specific example 2
- III. Body paragraph 2: Why I wish to attend school
 - A. Anecdote 1
 - B. Anecdote 2
- IV. Body paragraph 3: Plans after obtaining degree
 - A. Specific example
 - B. Anecdote
- Body paragraph 4: Local and state contributions that I plan to make V.
 - A. Specific example 1
 - B. Specific example 2
- VI. Conclusion
 - A. Restate thesis (reword it)
 - B. Personal details (add something new)
 - C. Reference to hook

Draft

Simply write out your outline in paragraph form with complete sentences. Don't forget to have a topic sentence for each of your four body paragraphs.

Revise

Revising is different from proofreading, because here is where you will rearrange sentences, replace dull words with more interesting words, and get rid of any use of passive voice. Avoid using dull words such as "really," "basically," "goals," and "dreams." Ask your school counselor or English teacher to read it and make suggestions. Trust me, your first draft is far from perfect.

Proofread

This is where you polish your spelling and grammar mistakes, make sure the formatting is correct, and check for appropriate use of formal language as opposed to informal (casual) language. Again, this is a good place to ask someone with more experience at writing to correct errors for you. Leave plenty of time to proofread. It is helpful to put your Statement aside for a few days, and then come back and look at it with fresh eyes.

Submit

Double check that you've fulfilled all requirements, including word count, if there is one specified. Also, make sure it's in the requested format (PDF, Word document, etc.).

Following these simple steps will ensure that you put your best foot forward when applying for scholarships and college admission!
